Dear Members of Hope, Lord, listen to our prayer, let your life-giving rains pour down on the parched earth, returning the green and growing season to your people. Amen

Water! Something we often take for granted is now something we worry about. We are desperately in need of rain. Farmers are worried about yield, water levels in rivers and lakes are low, gardeners are trying to water gardens in order to keep vegetables alive, in some places the water tables are low requiring water to be rationed. It is hot and it is dry. Our eyes watch the sky for signs of rain clouds. Since we are thinking of and praying for rain . . . let's reflect on water in scriptures.

Since water was, and is, precious in the Middle East, significant events in scripture take place in people's lives at water. Jacob's life involves both a river and a well. Jacob leaves home after tricking his father, Isaac into giving him the family blessing. He leaves home and begins a new life after crossing the Jordan river. Jacob meets Rachel at a well, falls in love and becomes embroiled in Laban's scheming, until he finally out smarts Laban and returns home, crossing the Jordan River again, making peace with his brother Esau, beginning a new life of peace with his brother. Moses led the Israelites from slavery to a new life of freedom across the Red Sea. Joshua led the people to the promised land across the Jordan River. Peace agreements were frequently signed at wells, community gatherings happened

at wells, and people's lives often changed in scripture when they went to a well. The woman at the well was forgiven by Jesus, her life changed forever as she embraced the living water Jesus offered her; belief in Jesus as the promised one. John the Baptist poured water over people, calling them to repent and change their lives. Ancient people lived in the country side, but the cities were built on high ground and mountain tops. In times of war, people took refuge in the city which became a fortress to protect them. They had ingenious ways to get water to the city. They dug down, from the top of the city mountain top, straight down to the bottom of the mountain, carving out steps on the inside of the mountain, then digging a tunnel to the well or water source just at the foot of the mountain. The access to the tunnel was hidden, and during an attack people would walk down the mile or two long stairway and out the tunnel to the water source. Israel's mountains have amazing tunnels that it is still possible to visit today. David conquered the city he renamed Jerusalem by finding the water source tunnel and following the tunnel into the city.

We all begin our new life in Christ with the waters of Baptism. We cross from the dry land of unbelief through the water to new life, being nurtured in our faith by Jesus, the living water and bread of life. Isaiah tells us that when we walk through flood waters, God is with us, keeping us from harm. In the season of Advent we read from Isaiah, chapter 35, "when the Messiah comes springs of water will burst out in the wilderness, streams will flow in the desert, thirsty ground will become a splashing fountain, and even the jackal (an animal the ancients did not like, so jackal means the least) will have enough to drink."

Praying, we remember the significance of water all through time. God has blessed us with abundance in the past, may God continue to bless us with enough. Here is a reflection about waters and wells by, Marcrina Wiederkehr, to use as we pray for rain together:

"What makes this world so lovely is that somewhere it hides a well. Something lovely there is about a well, so deep unpiped and real. filled with buckets and buckets of that lifegiving drink. A faucet will do in a hurry, but what makes the world so lovely is that somewhere it hides a well! Sometimes people are like wells,

deep and real natural (unpiped), life-giving, calm, cool, and refreshing. They bring out what is best in you. They are like fountains of pure joy. They make you want to sing, or maybe dance. They encourage you to laugh even when things are rough. And maybe that's why things never stay rough once you've found a well. Some experiences are like wells too. People create them. They are life-giving happenings. They are redeeming experiences. They are wells of wonder and hope. When you find a well, and you will someday, drink deeply of the gift within. And then maybe soon you'll discover that you've become what you've received, and then you'll become a well for others to find. So lift up your eyes and look all around you: Over the mountains, down in the valley, out in the ocean, over the runways, into the cities, into the country, sidewalks and highways, paths in the forest, into the hearts of a thirsty people. What makes the world so lovely is that somewhere it hides a well, a well that hasn't been found yet."
