Dear Members of Hope,

In 1998 The Women of the ELCA published a book in commemoration of their 10th anniversary made up of creative writings and drawings from women all over the country focused on gathering around tables. They chose the theme of tables since women tend to gather family and friends around tables to serve food, talk, have meetings or Bible studies. The book was released at Thanksgiving time when we all gather around tables to eat and give thanks. There are several submissions that stand out for me. The first is the picture I am sharing with this article. Doris Jorgensen drew that piece of art. Doris was a member at St. Paul's in Thornton lowa where I served for 7 years. She was very active in the church and community. She left us just a couple of years ago, well into her 90's. She never talked about being an artist, if asked about it, she just avoided it and said it was just a hobby. A strong, talented woman, who humbly lived among us in a tiny town.



The second is a story from Good Shepherd Church in Edina MN. When I was in college at St. Catherine's I volunteered at Good Shepherd. I was majoring in Theology and secondary education. The only thing available with that degree was to teach in a Catholic school. A new field of religious education was opening up at that time and that was what I had my sights set on. In order to get into that field I needed to take summer courses in practical theology. In those summer courses I met Sister Mary Ellen who was a religious education Director at Good Shepherd. She needed help and asked me to be her volunteer and also to learn from her. She was one of my mentors. The article in the book from the Women of the ELCA is about an elderly member of Good Shepherd, Helen, who had come from a family of 14 and had always served people, from her family as a child, to being a waitress as a career, to her own family, and now in the nursing home in her wheel chair, she continued to go from room to room asking other residents if they needed anything and bringing them anything they needed. She was filled with joy, saying that she serves for the Lord. At the end of her story she is dying, waiting alone, praying. "She is getting ready to serve tables in a new mansion, the one that her Lord and Savior has gone to prepare for her."

What tables have you gathered around for Thanksgiving and who have you gathered with? I remember my grandmother's big rectangular table in her dining room with my uncle and my father taking turns each year to carve the turkey as we all passed our plates around to fill up on all the good food she made. But I remember even more before and after the big dinner as we all gathered around her kitchen table nibbling as she made final preparations, or put away left overs, the best stories and laughter were around the kitchen table. After my grandmother left us, we would go to my aunts in Mandan North Dakota for a few years, at Thanksgiving. We would take the train, because my mother didn't like to fly. The train and our time together was fun. My aunt wasn't the best cook, but as children we just enjoyed getting together. We always came home to a snow storm. My mother's Thanksgiving tables had to glisten with crystal and silver. My brother and son had to have the same food each year. Tradition is very important to them. I like to try new foods, but they don't allow that on holidays. My son has had to change, now that he is married and his wife has her traditions, but my brother is immoveable. We have to have the foods he grew up with. Now we gather around my brother's round dining room table. We are more casual, Bill and myself, Louie, Gianni, and his girlfriend Hailey. Bill and I cook together, and I make some of the food ahead of time. We bring some of the food to my mother for her to enjoy, but it is too much for her to come eat with us. She stopped coming a few years ago. My son and grandsons will usually come visit sometime over the long weekend. Thanksgiving celebrations change, but they are still important, and I am grateful for the history, the people of the past and the surprising gifts of newness and new family that are part of my future. May you have a blessed Thanksgiving filled with blessed history and happy new memories!
