Dear Members of Hope,

October is here, somehow the summer has zipped by again and autumn is here. As much as I want to be in denial that summer has left us, the trees are waving their many colored branches at me as I walk and drive by them, telling me I have to face facts, it is fall. I am spending most Friday nights at my nephew's football games. Last Friday he played in Grinnell, an hour and half drive, so my brother and I didn't go. Louie played an amazing game and we missed it.

Not that I'm bragging. I will be in the stands this week cheering him on.

Fall is busy with activities, the churches and communities have all kinds of fall festivals. Pumpkins and apple cider abound. Speaking of apple cider, my friend Amy is coming on October 14 to run the half marathon in the cider run in Cedar Rapids. It begins and ends at Newbo Market. I will be cheering her on that morning and will meet her at the end with any physical support she may need. Newbo Market has excellent apple cider. I will cheer her on with plenty of apple cider. Hope will contribute to the fall activities with the craft fair, the second Saturday in November.

I have spent a number of years serving in small town rural settings. Fall is harvest time in those communities. I have had the pleasure of riding in a combine after the work of harvest was complete. Combines are amazing machines. They are computerized and measure the crop, moisture levels, everything farmers need to know as it is being harvested. When I had evening meetings in the church in the town I didn't live in, I never felt alone coming home at night during harvest. The combines and their lights were in the fields lighting my way. Not that one is ever alone in the country, but especially during the harvest, the animals are more active, eating grain that falls to the ground, fattening themselves up before winter. Deer, racoon, possums often run along the side of the road with an occasional bold coyote taking advantage of the abundant possibilities for their next meal. Harvest in the country is exciting but also dangerous. I was there, sadly, for the accidents that happen when farmers get tired because of the long hours they put in, or children climbing on the big machinery thinking they are toys, not realizing they are dangerous. I almost was taken out by a grain truck late one night, when a tired trucker forgot to turn his lights on and came barreling out of a field and on to the road. It was a dark night and my head lights caught the truck just in time for me to swerve out of the way. We need to remember the farming communities during harvest and pray for them.

Autumn is also a busy time in the liturgical or worship calendar. We are still in the season of Pentecost but we have feast days we will be celebrating. At the end of October we celebrate Reformation, Luther's attempt to reform the Church of his day that began the Lutheran Church and splintered off many denominations as people discovered many ways to be church. Reformation Sunday is also the Sunday before Halloween. The children's sermon that Sunday will invite children to bring their Halloween bags and have them blessed before they go trick or treating. The following Sunday, we celebrate All Saints Sunday. We will remember those who died at Hope this year members of the congregation will be invited to light a candle for loved ones you would like to remember. Candles and lights will abound! A few weeks later we will celebrate the harvest on Thanksgiving weekend and give thanks for all the blessings we have in our lives. Thanksgiving weekend is also Christ the King Sunday, the final Sunday of the liturgical year, the final Sunday of the Pentecost Season. So as we give thanks for our blessings we will Praise Christ as the only king we worship, the king who humbled himself on the cross and gave his life that we may have life forever. Let's celebrate and enjoy this autumn season together!
